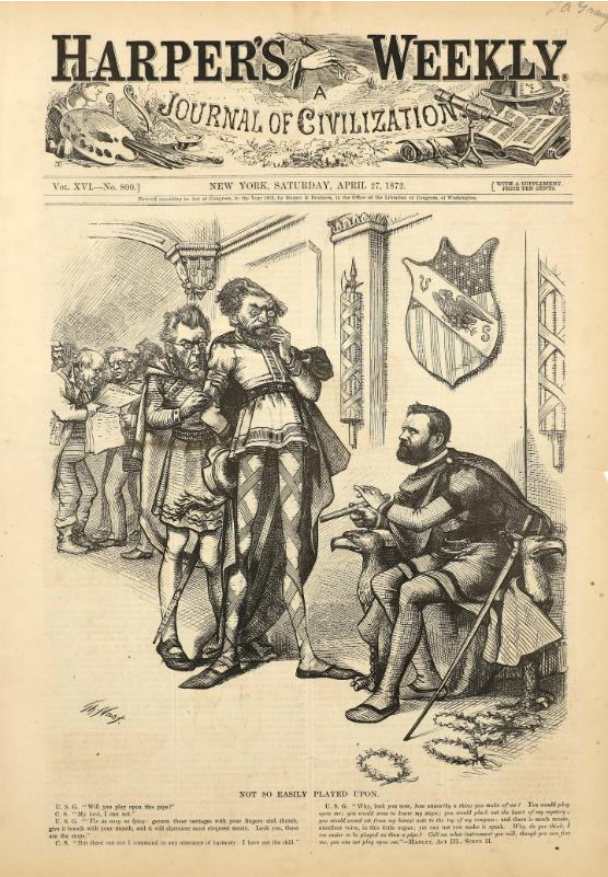




Not So Easily Played Upon, from "Harper's Weekly"
